BLACK HILLS & BADLANDS BIRDING TOUR

South Dakota and Wyoming May 24-30, 2024

A birding tour organized by <u>Seven Ponds Nature Center</u> and <u>Rocky Mountain Birding</u>

South Dakota's incredible geology and scenic landscape will provide a fantastic backdrop to our week of birding the Black Hills and Badlands (and beyond!). A wide diversity of habitats awaits, from the deep canyon rivers and forested rolling topography of the Black Hills to the windswept shortgrass prairie of northwestern South Dakota; from the stark rocky landscape of the Badlands to the impressive butte called Devils Tower. These varied habitats will give us a chance to see a large variety of birds during our tour of this scenic region.



Located in the heart of the continent, this region contains some of the most scenic landscapes of the west. The rugged Black Hills span more than 8,000 square miles of undulating terrain forested with Ponderosa Pine and rocky outcrops, with bird life similar to that of mountains further west. In northeastern Wyoming, Devils Tower rises more than 800 feet from base to summit, all that remains of an ancient volcano. North of the Black Hills we'll find a seemingly endless sprawl of shortgrass prairie, home to birds that seek the wide-open spaces that prairies provide. Dramatic and harsh, Badlands National Park is a landscape unlike any other on the continent, at once inviting and yet foreboding. Our tour will be based in Rapid City, South Dakota, which will provide a pleasant home base with all the amenities we require as well as a convenient launching point as we venture forth each day. Join us as we explore these regions and seek out the birds that make this amazing region their home.

TOUR ITINERARY

Our daily activities will be flexible based on species we've seen to date and recent bird reports, but the following outline provides a preliminary plan of how we will spend our days. Our plans are subject to change based on rare bird sightings, weather conditions, and road closures. Note: the birds listed are not intended to be an exhaustive list – just a sampling of what may be found at each location.

DAY 1 – Friday, May 24 – Arrival in Rapid City Plan your arrival in Rapid City by early afternoon and call for a ride to our hotel. We'll enjoy our first dinner together; birding starts first thing tomorrow morning.



DAY 2 – Saturday, May 25 – Black Hills—Custer State Park & Wind Cave National Park We'll kick off our birding adventure by traveling into the heart of the Black Hills. Custer State Park spans 71,000 acres and is home to a wide array of wildlife, including Bison, Elk, Mule Deer, Pronghorn, Bighorn Sheep, and Mountain Goats. The bird life is equally impressive, and here we will look for American Three-toed Woodpecker, Pinyon Jay, White-throated Swift, Red-naped Sapsucker, and Mountain Bluebird, just to name a few. Nearby Wind Cave National Park will provide additional opportunities for wildlife and birds. A visiting birder could spend several days exploring these two parks, but we'll do our best to experience as much as possible in just one day.

DAY 3 – Sunday, May 26 – Black Hills—Spearfish Canyon This beautiful area in the northern Black Hills includes majestic waterfalls, hidden caves, steep canyons, and ponderosa pine forests. Here American Dippers nest along Spearfish Creek, Canyon Wrens seek out the rocky bluffs, and MacGillivray's Warblers can be found in the shady undergrowth. In this area we'll also be on the lookout for Clark's Nutcracker, Western Tanager, Lazuli Bunting, Cordilleran Flycatcher, and many more. The Spearfish Canyon Scenic Byway is about 20 miles long and would only take about a half-hour to drive, but we'll be traveling at birder pace, stopping often to search for birds and take in the views.





DAY 4 – Monday, May 27 – Shortgrass Prairie Birding Today we'll venture north of the Black Hills to the shortgrass prairie. Leaving the forested hills behind, we'll encounter a completely different slate of birds – those that make the wide-open country their home. Key target species today are Baird's Sparrow and Chestnut-collared Longspur. Some of the additional prairie birds we hope to see include Lark Bunting, Upland Sandpiper, Western Kingbird, Dickcissel, Sprague's Pipit, and Western Meadowlark. The vast and seemingly endless vista, where trees are few and far between, will offer a striking contrast to the heavily forested Black Hills, adding new flavor to our tour.



DAY 5 – Tuesday, May 28 – Devils Tower National Monument We'll still be ten miles from Devils Tower when we see it rising above the surrounding landscape. As we approach, it will loom larger in our

view, standing 867 feet above its base. We'll enjoy a leisurely circuit around the 1.3 mile trail the encircles the tower. Though it will be difficult

to keep our eyes off that imposing geologic structure, we'll be on the lookout for the many birds that inhabit the area, including Golden Eagle, Western Wood-Pewee, Rock Wren, Townsend's Solitaire, Black-headed Grosbeak, Red Crossbill, and Plumbeous Vireo, among many more. Our visit to the out-of-the-way national monument will be one of the highlights of the tour.





DAY 6 – Wednesday, May 29 – Badlands National Park Maybe we saved the best for last! Badlands National Park protects a landscape unlike anything else in North America. The rugged rock formations that make up the park are the result of millions of years of geologic activity, where erosion carved valleys, canyons, buttes, pinnacles, spires, and other shapes into the landscape to create the Badlands as they are today. In addition to the stark geologic beauty, we'll see more habitats, including cottonwood and juniper stands, woodlands, and grasslands, resulting in a surprisingly diverse birdlife. Black-billed Magpies can be seen near the visitor

center and nearby campground. Blue Grosbeaks and Spotted Towhees inhabit the tangled shrubs. A wide array

of sparrows can be found in the grassy areas, including **Vesper**, **Grasshopper**, **Lark**, and **Clay-colored**. And raptors such as **Ferruginous Hawk** and **Prairie Falcon** patrol the spacious skies. A Bison herd 1,200 strong roams the open country and Black-tailed Prairie Dogs chatter and scamper throughout their dogtowns. The Badlands will be a perfect exclamation point to conclude our tour in South Dakota and Wyoming.





DAY 7 – Thursday, May 30 – Departure from Rapid City Plan your departure for anytime today. Enjoy breakfast at the hotel and hire a ride to the airport to catch your flight home. Hotel check-out is 11:00 AM.


TOUR LEADERS
