### In Memory of Michael Champagne

November 13, 1951 - August 2, 2024

The Seven Ponds Nature Center family lost one of its giants recently with the passing of Mike Champagne, who passed away at home after a courageous battle with pancreatic cancer. Mike was the executive director of Seven Ponds from 1992 until his retirement in early 2017. During his 25-year tenure as director, Mike led the nature center through much of its biggest growth.

Mike graduated from Michigan State University in 1973 with a Bachelor of Science in Zoology and earned a Master of Zoology from MSU in 1975. He was the chief naturalist at Fernwood Nature Center in Buchanan, Michigan from 1976-1992 before taking the reins at Seven Ponds. While he was the executive director at Seven Ponds, Mike remained a lifelong naturalist. He openly shared his vast knowledge of the natural world with those around him, mentoring the center's naturalists and teaching visitors and participants during his trips and programs. His appreciation of the natural world was contagious.

As director, Mike welded his vision for the nature center with the mission of Seven Ponds and guided the nature center forward through both physical expansion and program growth. During his first year as director, Mike started the annual Holiday Auction & Christmas Party, a fundraiser and celebration that continues to this day. Many projects and improvements were completed under his watch, enhancing the nature center experience for all who visit.





The most ambitious project of Mike's tenure was the renovation and expansion of the Interpretive Building. Mike spearheaded the capital campaign needed to provide the funds for the construction. Despite a major economic downturn that threatened the entire project, led by Mike the effort continued, and in 2009 the beautiful expansion was completed. Without Mike, it simply would not have happened.

Mike's leadership was always steadfast, humble, and with a good helping of humor. He relentlessly promoted stewardship that resulted in Seven Ponds becoming the lovely natural area that it is today, made the nature center a self-sufficient organization so that the sponsorship of Michigan Audubon was no longer needed, developed the high quality educational programs that are best in class for nature study, developed strong community relationships that resulted in the center being able to acquire more land, and served as a mentor for countless members and students. Mike was an inspiration to many as he shared his passion for the natural world.

While he will certainly be missed, Mike's legacy is broad and his impact will continue in those who knew him and everyone who visits Seven Ponds Nature Center.

#### Reflections...

Seven Ponds Nature Center is utilized by people in many different ways. Whether nature center members, casual visitors, or folks in the surrounding communities, each person finds their own niche here at Seven Ponds.

Many people participate in our various weekend programs, such as seasonal walks, canoe paddles on the ponds, pond dipping and field netting, searches for snakes, owls, salamanders, wildflowers, and more.

Parents and grandparents bring their children or grandchildren to explore, discover, create, and learn indoors in our Discovery Room or outdoors in our NatureScape.

Teachers bring their students for high quality environmental programs with our naturalists that enhance and reinforce the curriculum they are teaching.

Families take part in our special events, including WinterFest, EcoDay, Party at the Ponds, and Enchanted Woodland.

Homeowners enhance their backyard habitat for wildlife by purchasing flowers, grasses, and shrubs during our Native Plant Sale, benefitting insects, birds, and more.

Adults improve their mental and physical health with a peaceful walk on our trails, with Yoga at the Ponds, or during our Trek the Trails challenge in October.

Some people volunteer their time and talents, either as members of a volunteer group like the AsNats, Stingers, Friends of Herbs, or Butterfly Gardeners, or by helping with various tasks around the center or by participating in one of our Invasive Species Workdays.

Many folks attend the nature center through participation in one of our clubs, including the Astronomy Club, Beekeeping Club, Birding Club, and Photography Club.

The local community utilizes the expertise here at Seven Ponds to help them solve a nature dilemma they have encountered. We get phone calls nearly every day about injured animals, orphaned youngsters, invasive plants, installing songbird nest boxes, gardening for pollinators, or removing pests from their home. Most are calling because they are concerned about wildlife and want to do the right thing – and they depend on us to help them determine what that is – and we do our best.

We love that Seven Ponds is utilized in such varied fashion, and we hope everyone finds some value in who we are and what we offer. What is Seven Ponds to you?



### Wandering with the Birds By Daryl Bernard

Last year Laura and I purchased a small home in Gladwin County, where we plan to live during the next stage of our lives. Located on the Molasses River, the lot has proved to be quite birdy – my first "yard bird" was a Wood Thrush heard singing its heart out the day we closed on the house – and since then I've recorded more than 80 species of birds on the property.

Having been dedicated to "county birding" in Michigan for nearly ten years, I have extensively explored each of Michigan's 83 counties, including Gladwin County. But now I get to dig even deeper into my new, future home county. Per eBird, Gladwin County is one of the least birded and least birdy of Michigan's counties. But I think that's just because many birders overlook the county in favor of more populous counties or those located along the state's Great Lakes shorelines.

Since we purchased the house, I've been able to find some birds never previously recorded in Gladwin County, including Short-eared Owl, Lapland Longspur, Orange-crowned Warbler, and Semipalmated Sandpiper. Additionally, I've seen such uncommon birds as Golden Eagle, Forster's Tern, Caspian Tern, Short-billed Dowitcher, and Long-tailed Duck. This past summer I was driving a gravel road through mixed fields when I came upon a potpourri of grassland birds, including Clay-colored Sparrow, Vesper Sparrow, Savannah Sparrow, and Dickcissel. There are plenty of birds in Gladwin County!

Of course, there are still more birds to find! I have yet to come upon a handful of target species, such as Common Nighthawk, Least Bittern, Brewer's Blackbird, Upland Sandpiper, and Great Horned Owl. But you know I'll keep searching, because you never know what you might find when you're out there, wandering with the birds.


#### Farewell Brenna & Jackson


